Celebrating Geoffrey Brand

Born into a Salvation Army family in Gloucester, Geoffrey Brand embarked on a remarkable career that spanned the realms of music, leaving an indelible mark on various facets of the industry. Initially, Brand established himself as a professional trumpet player, gracing the stages of prestigious orchestras like the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, the Philharmonia, and the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden.

However, it was in the realm of brass banding that Geoffrey Brand truly ascended to prominence. His tenure as the professional conductor of the Black Dyke Mills Band marked a transformative period for the ensemble. Under his baton, the band achieved significant victories, including the National Championships in 1967 and 1972, the British Open Championships in 1968 and 1972, and the World Championship in 1970. Brand's commitment to pioneering new music for brass bands also introduced Edward Gregson to the scene during the 1970s.

Geoffrey Brand's multifaceted career extended beyond conducting. He ventured into publishing, BBC production, military music, record production, education, and entrepreneurship, leaving an enduring legacy in each of these domains. Notably, he served as the Music Advisor and conductor of The National Youth Brass Band of Great Britain from 1967 to 1974. His lifelong dedication to music enriched both the brass banding world and the broader musical landscape.

World Premiere Fragile Earth

Sir Karl Jenkins CBE, the globally renowned composer, defies musical categorisation with an illustrious career that has left an indelible mark on the music world. Born in Penclawdd on the Gower Peninsula and educated at institutions like Cardiff University and the Royal Academy of Music, his versatility spans genres and collaborations with musical legends like Elton John, George Harrison, and Andrew Lloyd Webber.

From jazz at Ronnie Scott's Club to jazz-rock fusion with Soft Machine, Jenkins' musical prowess knows no bounds. He's composed award-winning advertising soundtracks, scored films award winning soundtracks, and graced iconic shows like "Desert Island Discs."

With numerous number one hits in the UK Classical chart and 17 'gold and platinum' discs, Jenkins' impact on classical music is undeniable. In 2022, he accepted a commission from The National Youth Brass Band of Great Britain, resulting in the world premiere of 'Fragile Earth'. This composition, divided into three movements, powerfully addresses the devastating impact of global warming and reflects Jenkins' commitment to addressing urgent environmental issues through his extraordinary compositions.

Guest Conductor



Dr Robert Childs, a revered figure in brass music, boasts a distinguished career spanning over four decades. Renowned for his solo performances on prestigious global stages and masterclasses at top European conservatoires, he began as a principal euphonium in renowned Yorkshire brass bands.

In 2000, he assumed the role of Musical Director for Cory Band in Wales, leading them to multiple championships and the world's No.1 ranking.

With a Doctorate in Musical Arts and affiliations with The Royal College of Music and The London College of Music, he is a formidable force in education. Dr Childs' contributions extend to directing Brass Band Studies at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama, visiting professorships, and his role as Director of Artistic Planning for The National Youth Brass Band of Great Britain.

Guest Soloist



Dr David Childs, hailed by The Observer as a premier euphonium ambassador, boasts unmatched prowess and captivating stage presence.

Revered as a leading figure in brass music, he has graced stages across Asia, Europe, and North America. His stellar soloist performances include collaborations with top orchestras like the BBC, RTÉ, and the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic. A champion of contemporary music, he has premiered numerous euphonium concertos worldwide.

Throughout his career, Childs has received an array of accolades, including Arts Council Wales Creative Wales Award and ITEA Excellence in Recording Awards. Proudly rooted in the British brass band tradition, David has showcased the euphonium's classical potential and assumed prominent teaching roles at esteemed institutions. With multifaceted roles in the music world, he remains a true virtuoso.
